## Message from our Chairman



Welcome to 2017 sector 8! What a privilege to once again release a newsletter to a caring community. Yes it is a privilege as this newsletter speaks of a CPF that is growing stronger year after year. We have a positive membership growth, radio sales and financial support that is indicative of a community that is willing to stand together against crime. Our sector is not only a sector fixated on crime but also cares about the overall wellbeing of the area and its people.

Our sector took some serious hits in the beginning of 2016 with the nutritious Mercedes gang tormenting our sector and Krugersdorp as a whole. I am sure you can recall the horrific serial murders that rapidly swept through Krugersdorp, sadly even affecting our sector. This caused alarm and we had to take serious action, taking hands with SAPS, to put this to an end.

Peace settled back into our sector as well as Krugersdorp, proving that crime fighting is a collective effort from the community, security companies and SAPS. Various other crimes persisted during the year, house burglaries dominating all other crimes. We still have a problem in our sector with motorbike thefts out of properties however this is not isolated to sector 8 but a problem across the entire Krugersdorp as well as Roodepoort. These guys move quickly and are able to remove a motorcycle from properties within seconds.

We have also had a few house robberies, fortunately with no serious injuries. This created Trauma awareness and the need to have trauma debriefers, although still in its infancy stages we now have a very successful team taking good care of its members.

Our sector always tries to bring something positive back into the area to uplift its spirit with fun activities such as our annual Kloof walk, CPF Market, Movie in the park and Carols by candle light. I want to invite each and every one to keep an eye on our calendar this year and share in the fun and help support our sector by attending these activities and bring a friend along or invite your neighbour.

Our patrollers still keep an active eye on things in support of SAPS, our security companies and with the assistance from the community. Unfortunately we cannot do this alone and need your help to stay visible and aware of our surroundings. Remember that you as resident, member and community member can help us to be the eyes and the ears of SAPS.

We always need help to maintain an active presence throughout the sector and we welcome anyone willing and able to assist, please come chat to us. On that note I want to thank Kallie and Chantelle who coordinated the patrollers throughout 2016, they did an outstanding job with commitment and a positive attitude. We have 51 awesome men and women that are always on the road when you are not even aware of it. They respond to floods, fires, accidents, medical emergencies, crime and sometimes mind boggling situations.

We laughed throughout the year, we cried but all and all we are a great team whom can withstand the ups and downs while standing together against the elements, guys and girls I salute you!

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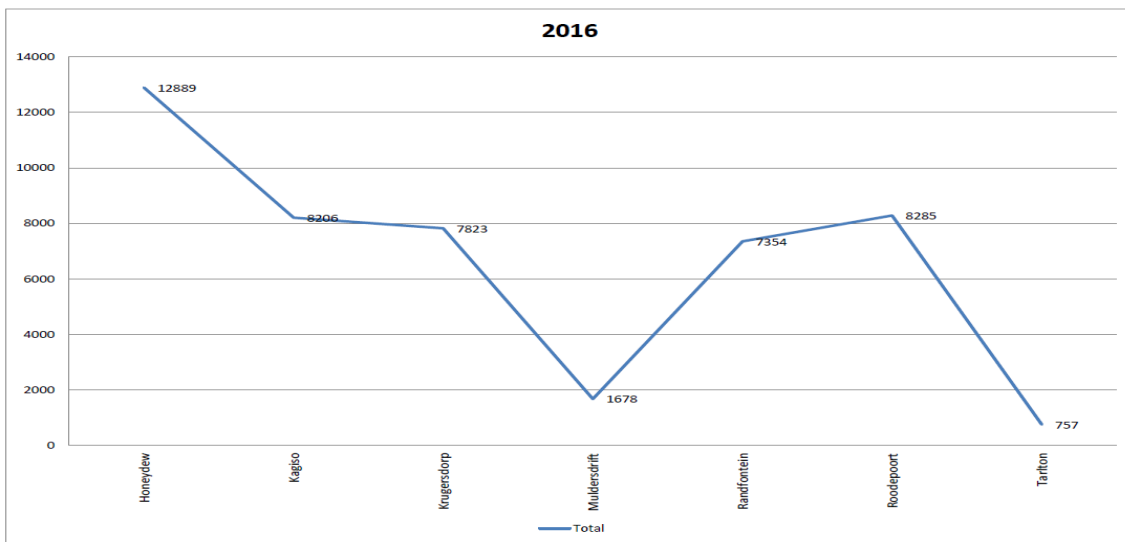

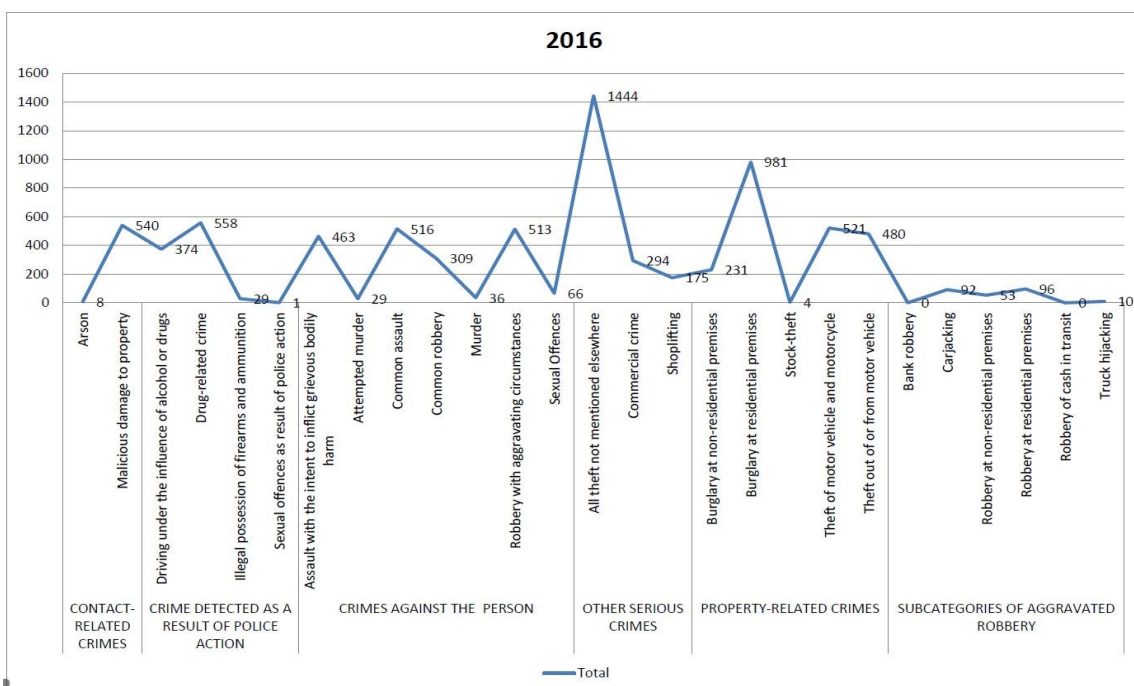

## Crime Overview in our Sector

The graphs below provide an indication of how Krugersdorp as a whole compare to our neighbouring suburbs, when comparing total crime incidents. As you can see we rank in the bottom four. When we unpack the types of criminal activities over Krugersdorp, it echoes what we experience on a day to day basis in our sector e.g. burglaries and vehicle theft are problematic.

## Message from our Patrol Manager

I would like to start by thanking each and every one for all the support we received. This includes hot drinks on cold evenings as well as the unexpected generosity when patrolling.

It has been a year full of activities intended to keep our sector safe, for example:

- The Kloof loop and clean-up, which we did twice this year, in conjunction with our neighbouring CPF sectors as well as the RNW. This included not only our section of the Kloof, but others as well.
- We did late night patrols and through the night patrols as well as early hours patrols.



The above is done by patrollers and the purpose of this is to discourage criminal elements entering our Sector. However residents can also assist by following the guidelines below, making our sector safer for us all:

- **Dustbins** – please keep your bins inside until the morning of dustbin day, putting them out the night before only attracts the diggers into our area the night before. Then also take them in as soon as you get home, we don't want the criminals to use it to hide in or use it as a way to enter the property.
- **Pavements** – check your pavement in the afternoons when you get home, for any markers. These may be anything from lids, cans, rocks, toilet paper or even spray paint on the street. Remove these markers.
- **Observation** – please look around when you enter the sector, if you see any "strange" behaviour, call it in. Remember to rather be safe than sorry.

In order to ensure patroller safety, we also participated in training events:

- Self-defence – we have had two self-defence training sessions to keep the muscle memory sharp and techniques up to date.
- Approach – how to approach a vehicle and make an arrest in the safest possible way.

To the patrollers I want to extend a BIG THANK YOU, for all your commitment and for leaving your family at home to try help others.

*WE can only make a difference if the community and patrollers work TOGETHER.*

As we all know 2016 has come to an end and so has my year being Patrol Manager. I would like to thank all residents and patrollers for their support and trust in me, throughout the year.

## Our Finances

With the start of 2017, reflecting on the past year one has to agree that it has been an exceptional difficult year for South Africa. A weakening Rand, interest rates going up, petrol prices reaching an all-time high and the draught resulting in food prices sky rocketing, just to mention a few challenges. All these factors contributed to the fact that consumers have to dig much deeper into their pockets and think twice before spending any of their hard earned cash. From a Sector 8 financial point of view, the effect was noticeable, but fortunately, even though it all, the community managed to maintain a sustainable healthy bank balance...

Over the past few years, the Sector 8 bank account slowly but steadily increase to well over and hovering around R200000. Some of the funds we received during the 2016 were used for Patroller Jackets and vests, but the long anticipated CCTV project is finally taking off. In a few weeks from now, you will notice cameras mounted at strategic points all over the Sector to add more visual security and peace of mind. All of this would not have been possible without the generous contributions of our members and sponsors, especially during our fundraiser events. We thank all of you in supporting our cause. Rest assured that every cent we gain, we plough back into the community in the seemingly endless battle against crime.

The table below shows our growth for the last 2 years. For 2016 we enrolled a total of 117 new members, followed by 119 radios sold for the same period. In comparison to the mammoth growth in 2015, this figure indicates a negative growth of 35% for 2016, which affected our total annual turnover by 26%.

However, if we ignore the 2015 statistics for the moment, the overall growth of the Sector from the previous years to date remained positive and steady. The radio sales from 2015 sure had an impact on the ICASA License renewals for 2016 with 205 entries. This figure is more than double compared to the previous 2 years.

The perfect way to end a great year.

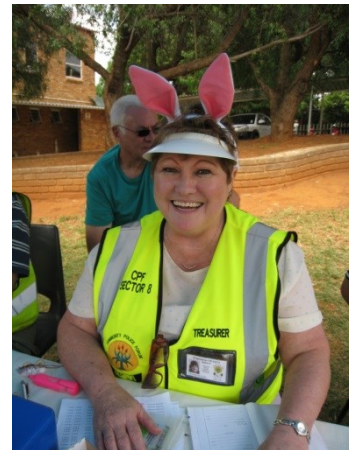

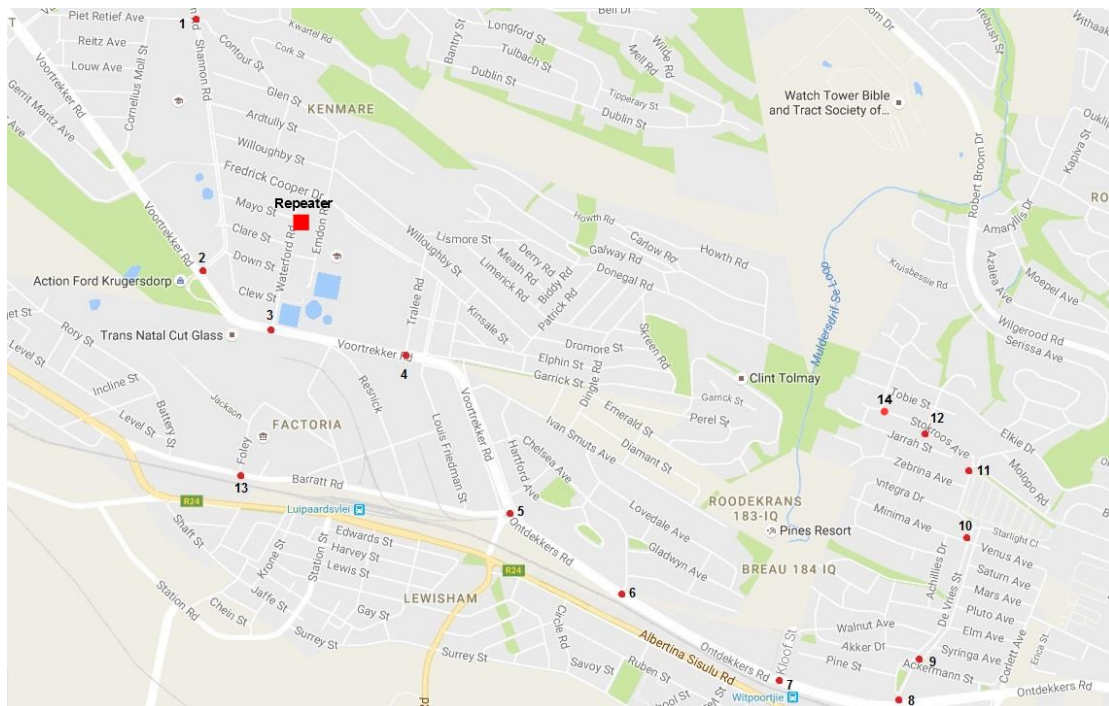
I would like to take this opportunity to thank June for her selfless efforts in managing the finances on behalf of Sector 8 and also for putting up with all the questions during our training sessions. She certainly deserves the break!

## Sector 8 CCTV Project

This project has been in the planning stage for Sector 8 a while, but this year we are fortunate enough that our financial position allows us to consider a phased implementation. Thirteen points of access in our sector have been identified at this stage at which we will install HI resolution network CCTV cameras. These cameras will be connected back to a central point through a private (our own) wireless network.

Footage will be recorded at the central points and will be available to the CPF should incidents occur in our sector. This footage could be used in criminal investigations and for us to identify criminal behaviour through the access areas. The diagram below shows the identified points of access.

We will use the community meetings to discuss ideas and provide project updates. Please remember that your contributions have made this a reality.



## Trauma Counselling

We are faced by some Traumatic event daily. How we deal with that event will determine how we move forward after this has happened.



- Trauma takes us by surprise; we are never quite prepared
- Trauma overwhelms us, making it difficult to function normally
- Trauma awakens us
- Trauma reduces us to inaction
- Trauma distorts our thinking, feeling and acting
- Trauma paint a gloomy picture of the future
- During the trauma survivors have inappropriate reactions to surroundings, are over- or under-active and susceptible to suggestions

Dealing with trauma is a process known as debriefing. Often, people have dramatic reactions to these extraordinary events that may leave them feeling overwhelmed and upset. When a significant crisis occurs, the individuals involved may benefit from an opportunity to talk about the experience either as individuals or as a group, depending on the circumstances.

For that reason, "trauma debriefings" have been promoted as a method to help healing and resolution. Research shows a significant decrease in the development of Post-traumatic Stress Disorder as a result, and trauma debriefing therefore appears to be pro-active. The goals of debriefing can perhaps best be described as follows:

- Prevention of Post-traumatic Stress Disorder. Debriefing is pro-active and helps to counter the development of Post-traumatic Stress Disorder.
- Creation of a "safe harbour". To create a safe environment in which the individual or group can be supported and guided by trained debriefers or traumatologists.

It has become essential that the image of a mentally sound and prepared community must at all times be maintained and promoted. The individual as well as a country's society as a whole may benefit from debriefing.

In August 2016 a team of candidates underwent training in trauma debriefing and we now have 12 competent debriefers that can be called out to any situation to be that 1<sup>st</sup> point of contact in a crises situation. Thanks to the CPF Sectors 8 for investing in their training and providing their jackets so that when they do arrive on a scene they will be identified immediately.

With a committed team like this I believe that we will be able to offer that comfort and understanding that so many members of our community are in need of, at those difficult times. Together we will secure a community that knows what it means to care for each other.

We also participated in special operations with SAPS and we feel the relationship has grown stronger during the course of the year.

Special thanks to our SAPS area manager Sergeant Terblanche for his continuous support and feedback. The Sergeant has helped to strengthen ties between our Sector and SAPS and his continued support and assistance has helped us to improve crime prevention on all fronts.

2016 has also seen the appointment of a new station commander at Krugersdorp. Brigadier Baloyi was appointed as station commander in early 2016, and from our meetings and interactions with him, we can foresee a great working relationship.

## Bullet Proof Jackets



In 2016 Sector 8 acquired an additional 10 bullet proof jackets. The jackets that were bought are SABS approved and are of high quality. These jackets were handed out to our most active patrollers and are in use every day. These jackets go a far way to help safe guard our patrollers on patrols and also when responding to incidents.

We would like to thank each and every Sector 8 community member who participated in fund raising activities as well as all contributions towards the funds raised to purchase the jackets.

Now our patrollers are a little safer when patrolling our streets.

## Our WhatsApp Groups



This year we established our WhatsApp groups for each area. We have broken our sector up into 9 sub areas and then proceeded to add all our members into their respective groups. These groups are also based on the roll call areas to ensure that all info shared on these groups is relevant to your direct environment. Although the groups were off to a rocky start in the beginning, most of the teething problems have been resolved and the groups are now functioning rather well.

### Important Disclaimer:

All new members of Sector 8 Community policing forum will be added to the respective WhatsApp group in their area. If the member does not want to be part of the WhatsApp initiative they are free to remove their cell phone number from the group at any time. Members are further advised that because their cell phone numbers are shared on the respective group they need to take cognizance of the fact that their number will be visible to all other members on that group.

We would however like to bring the do's and don'ts to your attention to ensure that the groups are used the way they were intended for:

### The Do's

- Share any information that relates to crime and safety in your direct area
- Share any information that might help your neighbour
- Report suspicious behaviour – But keep in mind that the group does not replace the radio
- When information is shared, please try to ensure that the information is as accurate as possible



### The Don'ts

- Do not share any information that is not specific to our area. Only information deemed to concern the members in our direct area should be shared.
- The WhatsApp group is not a chat room and should be treated as such. Please refrain from using the groups as a general discussion area
- The WhatsApp groups do not replace the radio!! So it should not be used for emergencies because the groups do not get monitored.
- The advertising of businesses and products are strictly prohibited
- No discussion will take place about politics, religion or any other topic that might be deemed offensive



We hope these guidelines will assist you in making the most of your membership to the CPF as well as the communication method.

We have experienced an increase in radio sales from January 2015 and many of us have new radios but we have never been part of or participated in a radio network. We know that it is always difficult to use a new tool for the first time, but it does get much easier with practice (radio communication tests). We have thought it a good idea to discuss basic radio protocol to make sure that our radios become effective communication tools. Always:

- Check that your radio is switched ON, usually the green light will be flashing.
- Check that Channel 1 is selected on your radio, under normal circumstances.
- Try to keep calm in an emergency.
- Think of what you are going to say before transmitting. Remember the three **WWW** to help you with that:
  - i. **Who** am I (Identify yourself – CALL SIGN)
  - ii. **Where** am I (Your physical address or description of current position)
  - iii. **What** is the situation (Be descriptive and provide as much detail as possible)
- Always press the PTT (Push-to-Talk) button, pause for 2 seconds, then talk.
- Speak slowly and clearly, talk across the microphone, not into it.
- Maintain pauses between transmissions.
- Use words such as - affirmative, positive, negative, repeat, over etc.
- Acknowledge responses promptly.
- Do not ignore any call to your Call Sign.
- Be courteous and remember that every member with a radio will listen to your call

**Be aware of where your radio is at all time and watch out that you do not accidentally push the PTT button e.g. in your pocket or handbag**

It is also important to remember the audience on the other side of the radio therefore I appeal to each and every one to always use proper radio etiquette and avoid foul language at all cost as children also listen in on the radio.
